



Council Initiatives

- · Implement a comprehensive and accelerated flood mitigation plan.
 - The Council authorized \$50K for a storm water flooding study in the 2022 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).
 - The Council authorized \$550K in future years to fund projects emanating from the study.
- Develop a Riverfront District.
 - City Council added \$50,000 to 2022 for a River District study in the 2022 CIP.
- Improve access and availability to public transportation.
 - The transit development plan (TDP) update has begun.
 - We anticipate it to continue through October.
 - · City Council appointed Councilor Heisler to serve on the TDP steering committee
- · Create a Comprehensive Communications Program.
 - City Council authorized \$30,000 for engaging Mueller Communications to assist the City in developing a comprehensive communications and public relations strategy.
 - · Presently evaluating the results of the city-wide survey pertaining to communications and information
- Add boardwalk, with steps to the water, on Lighthouse Peninsula.
 - Engaged with UW's CAPSTONE program to develop concepts for improvements to Lakeside Park, especially the peninsula. However, the CAPSTONE effort was canceled in March by UW.
- · Prevent long term lease agreements with private entities in parks without a public referendum.
 - This is not scheduled for a Council meeting but the legal research and course of action development are prepared.
