EAST DIVISION STREET—SHEBOYGAN STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT



The East Division—Sheboygan Street Historic District is historically significant due to the residential architecture. The District has 118 contributing and 13 non-contributing houses. (Non-contributing houses are those that do not contribute to the architectural significance of the District). The 28 homes highlighted on this brochure are representative examples of the types of architecture you will find in the District and reflect approximately 80 years of residential architecture. Architectural significance starts in 1852 with the construction of Hamilton House (375 E. Division Street) and ends in 1933 with the construction of Dr. Elmer J. Twohig’s House (310 E. Division Street). After 1933, residential construction practically stops with only 9 homes being constructed within the district between 1933 and 1963. The decline in residential construction is attributed to the tail end of the Great Depression and the years leading up to and including World War II.
